### ORGANIZATION BACKGROUND

Mith Samlanh was established in August 1994 and is a Cambodian led non-government organization committed to working with marginalized Cambodian children and youth, their families and communities. Mith Samlanh was formally registered as a local Cambodian NGO in 2002. Every year, Mith Samlanh provides various outreach programs, vocational training, education, counselling, food, shelter, medical services and income generation programs to 15,000 marginalized children, youth and families in Phnom Penh.

### VISION

Together, we protect marginalized children/youth and related groups and with them create innovative and exciting opportunities to build their futures.

### MISSION

Mith Samlanh is a local non Governmental organization, founded by Friends-International and a member of the CYTI Alliance, which works with and for marginalized children, youth, their families and their communities to build their futures.

- **Reintegrating** marginalized children and youth so they become actively involved in the development of their society;

### OVERVIEW
