MithSamlanh was established in August 1994 and is a Cambodian led non-government organization committed to working with marginalized Cambodian children and youth, their families and communities.MithSamlanh was formally registered as a local Cambodian NGO in 2002.Every year,MithSamlanh provides various outreach programs, vocational training, education, counselling, food, shelter, medical services and income generation programs to 15,000 marginalized children, youth and families in Phnom Penh.

MITH SAMLANH'S ACHIEVEMENT 2014: January to June

- 8,160 (F: 3,119) children and youth and 4,013 (F: 2,204) caretakers received services in Phnom Penh and Provinces since 1st January 2014.
- 588,754 (F: 216,829) services were provided to children, youth and their caretakers this quarter.
- 361 (F: 96) children and youth were supported to move away from street life since 1st January 2014.
- 346 (F: 142) children received remedial education since 1st January 2014.
- 26 (F: 15) new children were supported to reintegrate into public school since 1st January 2014.
- 1,407 (F: 612) children received support to remain in public school through follow up in Phnom Penh and Provinces since 1st January 2014, and 460 (F: 197) children stopped receiving support because they are successfully supported by their families.
- 419(F:112) youth received vocational training since 1st January 2014.
- 97(F: 21) youth were placed into employment (employment, self-employment, directly into employment and find job by themselves) in Phnom Penh and Provinces since 1st January 2014.
